

The ENTOMOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF QUEENSLAND INC., since its inception in 1923, has promoted the development of pure and applied entomological research in Australia, particularly in Queensland. Membership is open to anyone interested in Entomology. The Society promotes liaison among entomologists through regular meetings and the distribution of a *News Bulletin* to members. Meetings are announced in the *News Bulletin*, and are normally held in the Goddard Building, University of Queensland at 7.00 pm on the second Monday of each month (March to June, August to December) each year. Visitors and members are welcome. Membership information can be obtained from the Honorary Secretary, or other office bearers of the Society.

Contributions to the *News Bulletin* such as items of news, trip reports, announcements, etc are welcome and should be sent to the *News Bulletin* Editor.

The Society publishes **THE AUSTRALIAN ENTOMOLOGIST**. This is a refereed, illustrated journal devoted to Entomology in the Australian region, including New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the islands of the South Western Pacific. The journal is published in four parts annually.

EMBLEM: The Society's emblem, chosen in 1973 on the 50th anniversary of the Society, is the king stag beetle, *Phalacrognathus muelleri* (Macleay), family Lucanidae. Its magnificent purple and green colouration makes it one of the most attractive of all Australia Coleoptera. It is restricted to the rainforests of northern Queensland.

COVER: Wambo puticasus Allsopp, 1988

Wambo puticasus Allsopp was described in 1988 from specimens collected at Lake Broadwater, near Dalby. Unusually for a ruteline, it was collected in a pitfall trap — most Christmas beetles are collected at light or from feeding trees. The specific name reflects this, whilst the generic name honours the shire in which it was collected. Geoff Thompson did the drawing, the original of which is a prized possession of Peter Allsopp.



You will understand that it's not possible for me, to come to this meeting, but I am very interested to get contacts to other members of the QES, who are working with Australian noctuid and geometrid moths like me.

I have collected in Australia in November /December 2002 and in August/ September 2005. More than 800 species are found and from all of them I have good digital photos. I can send a CD with these photos and lists of the places they were found, if you are interested.

In February 2007 I will return to Australia to research further these Lepidoptera. During 7 - 20. February 2007 my friend and I will be in NSW (Blue Mountains, Canberra, Snowy Mountains) and from 20. February - 3 March we will be in Cairns. We will then return to Canberra for a few days to visit the ANIC again.

Request for information

To whom it may concern,

I am from Hungary and despite the fact that I am an MD I have been compulsive admirer of tropical arthropods since my early childhood. One of my hobbies is entomology but being very aware of the decline of endangered insect populations all over the world I shifted my activities from collection to taking photos. I would like to visit the beautiful rainforests of Queensland in the following year and I have some questions.

Which months are the best for taking photos?. I suppose the most attractive species spawn in the wet season. As an amateur entomologist, I experienced that swarming periods can be pretty short for Papillionidae and Lamellicorniae in temperate regions. Does it go for your tropical species, too? I am most interested in species such as *Ornithoptera priamus, Papilio ulysses, Coscinocera hercules, Phalacrognathus muelleri, Xylotrupes gideon* etc. When do they swarm? Further, can I get any help from local experts to get into their habitats to take photos? I would not like to wander quite "aimlessly" in a foreign habitat possibly interfering with the life of endangered and rare species. I would like "to keep a low profile" but to take as many beautiful photos as possible. Without the knowledge of the microenvironment some species prefer, it

must be a complete waste of time to try and find them. At least here in Europe it is the case. For some rare species I know the habitat where they flourish and the swarming period and then they can be seen in an immense amount. However two weeks earlier or later they are completely missing. Since I am especially interested in nocturnal species should I take my UV bulbs there or I can get some help in this regard? The latter would be better because I would not like to disturb species in extremely sensitive areas with "light pollution". Could you suggest me some contacts I am supposed to write? To tell the truth, I am certain that without the help of local experts it is almost impossible to take good photos. I would desperately need the help of a local field researcher I suppose.

Thank you ever so much in advance and looking forward to your answer.
