

CHANGE OF TIME AND VENUE FOR SOCIETY MEETINGS

For some time there has been a slow decline in attendance at evening meetings of the Society at The University of Queensland. TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2007

The Society's finances remained in a reasonably sound position during 2007. I continued to streamline the electronic invoicing and receipting and the payment process is now faster and more transparent. Invoicing was required throughout the year as many members delayed payment of their 2007 dues until the later half of the year, if at all. Additionally, a small percentage of members are consistently one year behind in their payments. Thanks to those members who promptly paid their dues at the beginning of the year.

A net profit of \$247.45 is reported for 2007. However, it should be noted that there are significant unpaid costs for bulletin printing, postage and preparation (\$1761.90) which were not invoiced until 2008 and will be carried into 2008. The Society therefore suffered a loss (\$1514.45) in real terms in 2007. This was expected at the beginning of the year when council decided to spend significant funds on improving the News Bulletin. An assistant was paid \$100 per issue for coordination and preparation and extra page charges were incurred intermittently with the inclusion of colour plates in some issues. This initiative was approved by Council to entice new members to the Society given that the bulletin is now the primary source of communication. Attendances at monthly meetings are quite low. Additionally, flyers, which include a membership application form, were produced for the Society at a cost of \$645. A free BBQ lunch was provided at the Perkins memorial lecture to entice potential new members to attend. These additional costs more than account for the financial shortfall reported above.

SOCIETY COLLECTING PERMITS - REPORT 2007

It has been a busy year on the collecting permit front with State Forest permits again being renewed. I have sent the 2007 report to QPWS with a current up-to-date list of all those who hold the permits. This year we have had a wonderful response from permit holders and most reports were received in a timely manner. Thank you to all who have contributed so willingly. I will be sending out a reminder in July that all permit reports for 2007-2008 need to be collated and sent in to me in August.

Please note that there are now new conditions on the State Forest permit. The condition requiring you to give vehicle details to the rangers in advance has been deleted although you are still required to contact rangers before entering any park. This is for your own safety as State Forests are logged or undergo fire management at times and rangers need to know who is in the park. Rangers are also the people who know the most about these parks and can be extremely useful contacts.

Specific condition 3: For those of you who don't have a copy of the Permit WISP03175405 (which is a permit to collect protected species -butterflies) you should carry the accompanying letter allowing you to collect under this permit **provided you do not collect protected species at any time**. For those of you who do have **the protected species permit it must accompany the permit.**

We now also have new return forms to fill out for 2007-8 which you should have received. If you have not then please contact me. It looks daunting at first but is similar to the form we have been using but there are a few changes and the items in grey are mandatory. QPWS have some abbreviations and categories we have not been using in the past. Please familiarise yourself with the requirements before you collect so you can gather the info you need whilst out in the field as it is much simpler than backtracking (speaking from personal experience!).

We have more members holding the permit but a decrease in the records given to QPWS (1567 records in total). This covers 48 reserve areas all over Queensland, slightly down from last year. A number of the records from these collections are now being published and thanks to those of you who have passed on reprints for me to send in with the returns to OPWS.

If there are any members who wish to take advantage of the permits please contact me on the address on the back of the newsletter and I will send you out an application form. If members have changed any of their details please let me know so I can alter my records.

All of our permits are up for renewal in 2008 so please keep an eye out for messages in the bulletin about reports and expiry dates.

Well done all and happy collecting for this year.

The Australian Entomologist EDITOR'S REPORT - 2007

Four parts of Volume 34 were published during the year, totalling 140 pages with 10 in colour. Readers might have noticed (with alarm) the large number of papers contributed by the Editor. This was caused by a chronic shortage of papers; only 10 articles (excluding those for the special issue) were submitted during 2006 and only 8 were still available for Volume 34. The only way to avoid a repetition of a large number of editorial contributions, short of assassination, is for readers to submit more articles themselves. Fortunately this seems to have been widely realised and the number of submissions improved dramatically during the current year. An impressive total of 43 papers was received during the 2007, of which only two were considered unsuitable. Twenty-four papers and three book reviews appeared in Volume 34 leaving 25 papers on hand for Volume 35. This means that larger issues should return for 2008. Notwithstanding the sometimes delayed return of revised manuscripts, the time from submission to publication is currently around 9-12 months, with shorter papers and notes often appearing more speedily.

I take pleasure in thanking all those involved, including our authors, referees and printers, for their contributions to the Journal.

BUSINESS MANAGER'S REPORT - 2007

This is my first report as the new Business Manager and I thank Richard Bull, the previous incumbent, for the excellent state of the books when I took over at the beginning of 2007.

The subscriber base of the journal has remained stable at about 260 for the last few years and this continued into 2007 with the loss of 6 due to deaths and resignations and the gain of 8 new subscribers. This is pleasing in view of the fall-off seen in many other publications. During the year a decision was made to allow the electronic subscription agency, Informit, to offer our publication. Since the rate they will offer it at is higher than the normal subscription rate, this is not expected to affect our normal subscriber base. More libraries are expected to take subscriptions as part of bundles of subscriptions offered by Informit.

A review of production costs was undertaken and considerable savings in printing costs was achieved by reducing the size of the print-run to yield a stock of only 20 back issues, instead of 120. The savings have been passed on to authors in the form of reduction of page charges from \$27.50 per page to \$20, and a reduction in the surcharge for colour pages from \$60 to \$50.

During the year the executors of the estate of Dr. E.N. Marks kindly funded a reprint of the special issue (Vol 33, Part 4) devoted to her acheivements in mosquito science. Stock of this important issue is now available at \$5.00 per copy.

The Society owes an enormous debt to our Editor, David Hancock, who continues to oversee a quality publication which plays an important role in Australian entomology.

ANNUAL REPORT ON "BUGCATCH" PROGRAM 2007

"Bugcatch" is a program of field trips organised jointly by the Entomological Society of Queensland and the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service and is aimed at utilising the specialist skills of Society members to provide information to QPWS on the insect fauna of selected National Parks.

During 2007 two successful trips were held. Nineteen people came along to a daytrip held at Mt Glorious on 28th April and used many methods to sample the rainforest that surrounds the old Forestry Barracks in an area not open to the public. A welcome addition to the group were three entomology students who used the day to augment their insect collections. The more adventurous were able to ride up to the rainforest canopy in the truck-mounted cherry-picker which Steven Johnson brought along for the day. The second Bugcatch trip was a weekend camp at Canungra on November 2-4 beside the remnant rainforest patch which forms Sarabah National Park. Fourteen people camped for two nights and had good collecting following recent rains. Three MV lights were operated at night and the younger members of the group enjoyed acquatic collecting in the creek. We'll be announcing the planned trips for 2008 shortly.

OUTGOING PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In 2007, the Society held several council and general meetings, presenting seminars from diverse subdisciplines in entomology such as systematic, medical, physiological and ecological entomology. In addition, a Perkins Memorial Lecture, which was well attended, was delivered by Prof. Andrew Austin from the University of Adelaide.

However, being involved with the Society for the last couple of years, I have been disappointed with the attendance at the general meetings. Usually only 13-20 people show up, most of whom are regular attendees with 5-9 of them being council members who attend the general meetings that follow the council meetings. We tried changing the time of general meetings to an earlier time (starting at 5pm), but attendance dropped even more. Following the great success of the daytime meeting held at CSIRO Long Pocket for the Perkins Memorial Lecture in November, Council has decided to trial running general meetings as similar lunctime events at CSIRO for all of 2008 (see details and map elsewhere in this Bulletin). I warmly invite you to bring along your sandwiches and help us make these meetings a success. A more serious problem is that young entomologists are not attending meetings or becoming members of the Society. It seems that the Society must re-evaluate its appeal to entomologists at the beginning of their career.

A highlight of this year was the success of a teaching grant application submitted by The University of Queensland to the Carrick Foundation. This will establish a national curriculum in entomology through a distance entomological education program. The Society was one of the contributors to the grant application. Closure of entomology departments, lack of replacement of retired entomologists at Australian universities, and significant reductions in course offerings throughout Australia have led to fewer entomology graduates. I hope that this new initiative enhances collaboration among entomology educators and improves entomological education in Australia. I wish the program leader, David Merritt, and the steering committee of the project all the best. More details of this program were published in the September 2007 issue of the News Bulletin (Vol. 35, issue 6).

The Bulletin was run by Anna Marcora and Claudina Rodriguez during the past year who enthusiastically gathered contents for the Bulletin and did their best to make it more interesting for all members. Although we didn't have a December meeting, they put together an interesting issue. Well done! Perhaps

the most challenging part of their job was to receive abstracts of the meeting presentations on time for publication as proven not to be an easy task sometimes. I congratulate Anna and Claud for their fantastic job. Gracias!

Two bugcatch programs were organized by Geoff Monteith and Chris Lambkin to Mt Glorious (April) and Glen Witheren & Sarabah National Park (November) that were well attended. It was good to know that some students from UQ attended the Mt Glorious visit. Geoff graciously accepted to provide transport for students from UQ to the site. I thank them both for keeping the program up and running.

The Australian Entomologist had a successful year under capable hands of the editor David Hancock and Geoff Monteith as business manager. The journal is in a very good financial state and has kept a high subscription rate. Interestingly, a large proportion of the subscribers are not members of the Society! A new colourful flyer produced by the council was sent to those members inviting them to join the Society.

The Society's Student Award was presented to Ms Deanna Bayliss from UQ supervised by A/Prof. Gimme Walter and the runner up, Ms Daniels, was congratulated for her quality submission.

Gunter Maywald, as secretary, started a challenging life last year by commencing his PhD at UQ. Despite this, he continued his role in the Council and did a fantastic job. I would like to thank him for his service and wish him all the best in his studies.

USDA ARS AUSTRALIAN BIOLOGICAL CONTROL LABORATORY— INDOOROOPILLY

Jeff Makinson and Tony Wright surveyed the climbing fern, Lygodium microphyllum in the Northern Territory in January and collected the pyralid moth Neomusotima conspurcatalis. These moths will be used to boost field releases in Florida where Lygodium is a serious weed. The official release of N. conspurcatalis occurred on the 31st January 2008. Ryan Zonneveld and Matthew Purcell are continuing studies on the aquatic moth from Indonesia, Paracymoriza vagalis, a potential agent for the submerged aquatic weed Hydrilla verticillata. Bradley Brown is completing testing on the bud-weevil Haplonyx multicolor for the broad-leaved paperbark, Melaleuca quinquenervia.

Progress reports to the Assembled FLYTREE team by Brian Wiegmann, Shelah Morita, Michelle Trautwein, Matt Bertone, (North Carolina State University); Marcus Friedrick (Wayne State University), David Yeates (CSIRO Entomology), Greg Courtney (Iowa State University), Chris Thompson (US National Museum of Natural History), Gail Kampmeier (Illinois Natural History Survey), Chris Lambkin (QM), Jeff Skevington (Agriculture & Agri-Food Canada), Rudolf Meier (National University of Singapore), Brad Sinclair (Canadian Food Inspection Agency), Brian Wiegmann (North Carolina State University), Thomas Pape (Zoological Museum, University of Copenhagen) covered the morphological and molecular data collection, informatics, student work, analyses, publications, and web products.

While at the Coweeta lab in the Appalachians in western North Carolina, the assembled Dipterists took advantage of the creeks in the nearby forests in full fall to successfully seek out larvae of the Families Nymphomyiidae and Axymiidae, neither of which is found in Australia.

Ben Lawson has finished his one year postdoc on Weed CRC money and has landed a job with DNR&M (well done Ben).

Lynda Perkins has a research student working with her on the foraging behaviour of Lepidoptera larvae. Kirat Chand is working on how exposure to plant volatiles during feeding changes the behaviour of *Helicoverpa armigera*.

Elizabeth McGraw and Scott O'Neill have just been funded by the NHMRC, in collaboration with groups at QIMR, to develop the naturally occurring symbiont, *Wolbachia pipientis* for modulation of insect vector lifespan.
