



Meetings are announced in the *News Bulletin*, and are normally held on the second Monday of each month (March to June, August to December), or on Tuesday if Monday is a public holiday. Visitors and members are welcome. Membership information can be obtained from the Honorary Secretary, or other office bearers of the Society. Membership is open to anyone interested in Entomology.

Contributions to the *News Bulletin* such as items of news, trip reports, announcements, etc are welcome and should be sent to the News Bulletin Editor.

The Society publishes THE AUSTRALIAN ENTOMOLOGIST. This is a refereed, illustrated journal devoted to Entomology in the Australian region, including New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the islands of the South Western Pacific. The journal is published in four parts annually.

EMBLEM: The Society's emblem, chosen in 1973 on the 50th anniversary of the Society, is the king stag beetle, *Phalacrognathus muelleri* (Macleay), family Lucanidae (Coleoptera). Its magnificent purple and green colouration makes it one of the most attractive beetle species in Australia. It is restricted to the rainforests of northern Queensland.

The issue of this document does **NOT** constitute a formal publication for the purposes of the "International Code of Zoological Nomenclature 4th edition, 1999". Authors alone are responsible for the views expressed.

Main Business

Australia's Most Unwanted

Bill Crowe, AQIS

The Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service (AQIS) operational costs are mainly recovered via industry fee for service charges. Biosecurity requires a shared responsibility and partnership with industry and this was re-enforced by the Beale Review (2008) which confirmed the importance of industry and the community in the Biosecurity continuum.

AQIS employs (approximately 3,300 inspectors around Australia) and, nationally, AQIS entomologists, identify more than 20,000 pests and plant pathogens each year from imported vessels and cargo. Approximately 70% of these are exotic or of unknown status in Australia. AQIS entomologists are required to be good generalists as



a consequence of the diversity of pests arriving at the border. Specialist networks are needed to deal with new pests regularly intercepted that challenge current diagnostic capacity. Taxonomic networks and new technologies (e.g. RD) are critical for effective diagnosis of pests and diseases and analysis of biosecurity risks.

Australia's geographic isolation has provided a natural barrier to the entry of many plant and animal pests and diseases but increasing travel and trade threatens Australia's pest and disease free status. Travel and trade are increasing again as a result of the strong Australian economy and high Australian dollar.






