The Society publishes THE AUSTRALIAN ENTOMOLOGIST. This is a refereed, illustrated journal devoted to Entomology in the Australian region, including New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the islands of the South Western Pacific. The journal is published in four parts annually.

EMBLEM: The Society's emblem, chosen in 1973 on the 50th anniversary of the Society, is the king stag beetle, *Phalacrognathus muelleri* (Macleay), family Lucanidae (Coleoptera). Its magnificent purple and green colouration makes it one of the most attractive beetle species in Australia. It is restricted to the rainforests of northern Queensland.

The issue of this document does **NOT** constitute a formal publication for the purposes of the "International Code of Zoological Nomenclature 4th edition, 1999". Authors alone are responsible for the views expressed.

Australian native stingless bees — recent research on a species with a variety of potential commercial applications

Several species of stingless bees belonging to the genera *Austroplebeia* and *Tetragonula* are native to the northern parts of Australia. These bees are fascinating and ecologically important species and also have a potential role in human economy. First they could be managed for commercial pollination of tropical crops. Second, they are producers of honey with gourmet and medicinal properties. Third, they are gaining popularity as "pets" thereby providing contact with nature for increasingly urbanized populations.

Honorary Membership for Geoff Monteith


As reported in the Minutes of the last General Meeting, Dr Geoff Monteith was elected to Honorary Membership of the Entomological Society of Queensland.

Geoff Thompson gave the following talk about Geoff's contributions to the Society and to Entomology.

This is a special honour conferred by the society under the constitution on "any person who has rendered distinguished service to Entomology." Although Geoff is extremely distinguished company, I can't think of anyone who deserves this honour more.

Geoff has dedicated his life to Entomology in all its forms. His love of the science, of insects (especially collecting them) and his high standards have kept him working long hours in his professional and society roles.

In his vote of thanks for the first Perkins Memorial Lecture, given by Edgar Reik in 1977, Geoff recounted how FA Perkins guided him into studying biology as a 17-year-old high-school graduate and hooked him on insects in 2nd year with his lectures and a Binna Burra field trip. Geoff started out his collecting career in earnest as a field assistant at Bishop Museum's Wau Ecology Institute in 1961-62. He started work at the Entomology Department from that year, graduated in 67 and was awarded his PhD on Australian Mezirinae: Aradidae in 1979. He served as curator of the UQ insect collection from 1966-1978, when he became senior curator at Qld Museum, till his



retirement in 2006. Geoff boosted both collections enormously both in specimen numbers and localities investigated.

Geoff has a special interest in rainforest insects and has collected in this habitat all over Australia, in New Caledonia, Fiji etc. He has surveyed rainforest mountains (on foot), dry scrubs and many other habitats, collecting across wide faunal interests. His collecting and loan program has led to about 200 species being named after him. In more recent years at QM he concentrated on dung beetles building up a matchless collection of over 60,000 data-based specimens. His long list of 96 formal publications covers a huge range of subjects from straight taxonomy of Hemiptera and Coleoptera to ecology, behaviour, life history, plant-insect interactions and history.

Geoff has promoted entomology in books, articles, web pages, displays lectures and workshops all over Qld. In 1992 his suggestion transformed a society proposal

to promote entomology in the Queen St Mall into Living with Insects – Friends and Foes, the most successful temporary display ever held at Qld Museum. Geoff negotiated the donation of the FP and AP Dodd Collection of Tropical Insects in 1987. He curated its display and wrote a book The Butterfly Man of Kuranda - Frederick Parkhurst Dodd. The book won the Whitley Award for the best History of Zoology book published in 1991/92 and the display was seen by many thousands of people all over Qld, other state capitals and all over New Zealand. Geoff travelled with it, delivering lectures and workshops as well. The exhibition was recently redesigned and displayed, retaining Geoff's original label text, in Brisbane and Toowoomba and the book has been reprinted in smaller format. Watch out for Geoff promoting it on ABC's Collectors

Geoff is a true society man and has always been prepared to step into the breach to stop society decline or to defend principles from outside attack.

He has served this society in many roles since becoming our librarian in 1962. He was secretary 1968, member and chair of the publication committee 1969-71, president 1974, chair of the fauna subcommittee 1973-1975 and councillor 1988-1989, 2004-2006. He served as assistant editor of *The Australian Entomologist* from 1993 until 2007, when he took on his current role as business manager.

He was a councillor and 1983-84 and President of Qld Naturalists' Club, organising two major club field trips to Cape Tribulation and Kroombit Tops.

He was editor of Aust. Entomological Society's News Bulletin for ten years as well as serving as regional councillor, on their conservation committee and on the organising committee of two major conferences. The society awarded him their inaugural service award in 1994 and honorary life membership in 2008.

On top of the awards already mentioned, Geoff has been awarded the 1997 Australian Natural History Medallion by the Field Naturalists' Club of Victoria, the 1998 Queensland Natural History Award by the Queensland Naturalists' Club and the Queensland Museum Medal in 2007.

It is fitting that this society, that Geoff has been a stalwart of for so long, should honour him in this manner.

I would like to formally move that Geoff be elected as an Honorary Member of the Entomological Society of Qld.

News from DEEDI Insect Collection

In February **Desley Tree** undertook a two week training course, 'Thrips Advanced Diagnosticicans Development', with Dr Laurence Mound at ANIC, Canberra. Desley has also just completed her final year for Aphids Advanced Diagnosticicans Development with Dr Bob Foottit, Canada. Desley has been awarded a DAFF Diagnostic Training Scholarship for scale and mealybugs and will study with Dr Penny Gullan in Canberra over the next 12 months.

In collaboration with Laurence Mound, Desley will soon start a 3 year ABRS Bush Blitz project on the 'Descriptions of, and identification keys to, fungus-feeding Australian species in five genera of thrips'.

Justin Bartlett recently attended a two day workshop on European House Borer in Perth. One delegate from each state was invited by DAFWA to receive training in lab and field identification of EHB as a knowledge sharing exercise prior to the downscaling of their EHB Management program. The training was excellent and voucher specimens of adult and larval *Hylotrupes bajulus* are now lodged in the DPI Insect Collection.

Nate Hardy resigned from DEEDI and has returned his native North America.

Introducing the New President: Lyn Cook

Lyn Cook is an academic in the School of Biological Sciences at The University of Queensland.

Lyn grew up in northern NSW, where her first paid job involving insects was additional pocket money from her mother for catching cabbage white butterflies (*Pieris rapae*) in the backyard vegie patch. She undertook her undergraduate studies at The Australian National University in Canberra, majoring in zoology, genetics and evolution. For her fourth year Honours project, Lyn studied a gall-inducing scale insect genus (*Apiomorpha*) with Professor Penny Gullan (ANU), and continued studying the biology and evolution of the group for her doctoral thesis, which she submitted in 2001.

Lyn then worked for four years in postdoctoral positions with Professor Mike Crisp

(ANU) on plant systematics, specialising in the evolution of Australian plant groups such as the egg and bacon peas and *Melaleuca*. The work with Australian plant groups allowed Lyn to better integrate studies of insect and plant interactions in an evolutionary framework. In addition, in taking a closer look at the plants, she has discovered over a hundred previously undescribed gall-inducing scale insects.

Lyn came to Queensland in 2006 to take a position in Insect Systematics at UQ, where she is currently a Senior Lecturer in Insect and Plant Systematics. She has been an Associate Editor of *Invertebrate Systematics* since 2008 and has been a Councillor from 2007 to present (President from 2008 to 2009) of the Society of Australian Systematic Biologists.

Lyn has published over 50 scientific papers, with about half on insects. Six of her current postgraduate students are studying insect taxonomy and systematics.



Insects in Public Art — Protest sculptures in SA

We've had an irregular series in the News Bulletin of photographs of examples of public art based on insects. Two spectacular examples from South Australia are shown here. Federica Turco and I came across them in mid-March while driving north from Adelaide on the A1 Princes Highway, heading to our collecting destination of Mt Remarkable at the southern end of the Flinders Ranges. South of Port Wakefield the road passes through a long stretch of pretty desperate countryside: just grasses, stunted saltbush and lots of salt burned flats. Signs announced that a large section had been earmarked to be an Indus trial waste dump and some of it was labelled grandly as part of the "Port Wakefield Proof and Experimental Establishment". The waste proposal had clearly been fought against by a protest group which had erected beside the highway about a dozen giant welded steel sculptures depicting all sorts of protest symbols ranging from Zorro and Spacemen to the Man from Snowy River. Most had faded political placards with messages criticising the planned development. The fact that most named the long-gone SA politician, John Olsen, as the object of the campaign at least dates them to around 20 years ago. Reproduced here are the two insects sculptures, a bushfly and a cockroach.


