Meetings are announced in the *News Bulletin*, and are normally held on the second Monday of each month (March to June, August to December), or on Tuesday if Monday is a public holiday. Visitors and members are welcome. Membership information can be obtained from the Honorary Secretary, or other office bearers of the Society. Membership is open to anyone interested in Entomology.

Contributions to the *News Bulletin* such as items of news, trip reports, announcements, etc are welcome and should be sent to the News Bulletin Editor.

The Society publishes **THE AUSTRALIAN ENTOMOLOGIST**. This is a refereed, illustrated journal devoted to Entomology in the Australian region, including New Zealand, Papua New Guinea and the islands of the South Western Pacific. The journal is published in four parts annually.

**EMBLEM**: The Society's emblem, chosen in 1973 on the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Society, is the king stag beetle, *Phalacrognathus muelleri* (Macleay), family Lucanidae (Coleoptera). Its magnificent purple and green colouration makes it one of the most attractive beetle species in Australia. It is restricted to the rainforests of northern Queensland.

## **Presidential Report for 2012**

# Treasurer's Annual Report for 2012

During 2012 the society saw a small membership net increase of approximately 1.5% to 286 paying members. The cost of sales was slightly lower in 2012 than the previous year of 2011 but the trading profit of \$3,943.65 was down marginally from last year (\$4,378.37). In August a term deposit matured and \$10,551.51 was reinvested to help generate a higher interest rate for the society's funds. # The Entomological Society of Queensland Collecting Permit Annual Report 2012

As of mid January 2013 when our Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS), Department of Resource Management (DERM) Scientific Purpose Permit report was due, 83 members were endorsed on the ESQ collecting permits, WITK10612112 and TWB/03/2012, that allowed collection of invertebrates on 138 reserves, including National Parks. State Forests, and Forest Reserves. Those members had been requested to submit their annual reports outlining locality information for specimens collected and identified by mid December. Most members submitted null returns. 28 members reported on specimens collected. The 2012 amalgamated annual Wildlife Data Return and Report to OPWS covers over 2000 invertebrate specimens including Spiders; Beetles; Flies; Bugs; Thrips; Lepidoptera: - Hesperiidae, Lycaenidae, Nymphalidae, Papilionidae, Pieridae, Sphingidae, Saturniidae.

# Australian Entomologist Journal Report for 2012

Four parts of Volume 40 of *Australian Entomologist* were prepared during the year, totalling a record 336 text pages with 81 pages in colour. These included 37 original papers, three pages of new literature listings for Australian insects and lists of Smithers patronyms and publications. Thirty-seven new manuscripts were received during the year and there are currently 9 manuscripts in hand to be carried forward for 2013 issues of the journal.

During the year Dr Chris Burwell of the Queensland Museum relinquished his Assistant Editorship after 16 years and we record our thanks for his long service. David Hancock continues as Editor and does the electronic layout of all papers. Federica Turco continues as Assistant Editor and Manuscript Coordinator, while Geoff Monteith has added Assistant Editorship to his ongoing Business Manager duties. Federica now does the final insertion of high resolution images into the master file prior to printing.

With the sudden demise of our previous printer we changed to Bayfield Printing at Brendale at the start of the year and have received good quality printing at much lower rates and turnover time than previously. This has partly contributed to our making a significant profit of around \$4500 for the year (se Financial Statement) and has allowed us to further reduce page charges for authors from \$15 to \$10 per page from the start of 2013. These rates include unlimited use of colour.

The third issue of the year was a large issue of 112 pages with 12 papers and 40 pages of colour. It was the second perfect bound

issue produced. But the highlight of the year was the production of the 128-page, perfect bound Courtenay Smithers Memorial Issue as the last issue of the year (Vol 40, Part 4). This included 4 invited papers dealing with aspects of Courtenay's life and 9 other papers dedicated to his memory. It attracted substantial financial support from the Australian Museum and from donations from subscribers.

The Publication Committee would like to thank the many people (subscribers, authors and referees) who contribute to the *Australian Entomologist* and help to keep it as a vital part of the Australian entomological scene.



# OBITUARY Harry Standfast AM (6 June 1930 – 2 November 2012)



The world of mosquitoes and arboviruses in Australia and internationally has lost a man of great stature and wisdom with the sudden passing of Harry Standfast.

Harry was born in Ipswich on 6 June 1930. He attended Ipswich Grammar School and went on to complete a Science degree at the University of Queensland with a major in Microbiology. In 1949, he commenced his first full-time job as a cadet in Dr John Tonge's State Health laboratory in William Street, Brisbane. Harry's interest in insect borne diseases led to Dr Tonge introducing him to Dr Ian Mackerras, then the Director of the Oueensland Institute of Medical Research (QIMR). In 1955, at the urging of Dr Mackerras, Harry successfully applied for a position as a Malaria Control Officer in New Guinea, which he held from 1956 to 1962.

Harry described this experience as being "like something out of a Boys' Own Annual, dealing with locals armed with bows and arrows, spears and axes often wearing nothing or almost nothing". During his time in New Guinea, in 1957 Harry had a WHO Fellowship to study malaria control programs in the Philippines, Borneo, Taiwan and Malaya. He spent four years in the Sepik District setting up and running a large experiment to assess the effectiveness of DDT as a malaria control agent. He also organised control programs in New Ireland, New Britain, Bougainville and the northern islands of the British Solomons. I recall his stories about how the introduction of DDT for residual surface mosquito control reduced malaria infant mortality rates in the villages from over 50% to less than 10%.

In 1962, Harry and his family returned to Brisbane where he was appointed as a Research Entomologist at QIMR. He was part of the arbovirus research team under the leadership of Dr Ralph Doherty. The team, among other things, carried out pioneering field work at Mitchell River Mission, now Kowanyama, on Cape York. This site would go on to produce 20 new Australian arboviruses by 1976. A key achievement of the group was the first isolation of Ross River virus from Aedes vigilax saltmarsh mosquitoes collected on the banks of the Ross River at Townsville in 1959. While at QIMR, Harry was an observer and commentator on the early trials of aerial mosquito control conducted at the Gold Coast.

In 1967, Bovine Ephemeral Fever (BEF), an insect-borne disease of cattle, swept from the Kimberley to Victoria in just a few months. Investigations of this outbreak brought together scientists from QIMR, CSIRO and Primary Industry Departments. It saw the beginning of a great field team when Harry met and worked with Alan Dyce, a biting midge specialist with CSIRO Division of Animal Health from the McMaster Laboratory in Sydney. They developed new techniques for collecting and processing mosquitoes and biting midges to isolate viruses from them. In

1970, Harry was "poached" by CSIRO to Long Pocket Laboratories in Brisbane to join the team working on insect-borne viruses in livestock and native animals.

In 1972 I commenced work with CSIRO at McMaster Laboratory in Sydney with Alan Dyce and under his guidance worked on Culicoides biting midges. The McMaster Lab shared joint field programs on livestock arboviruses and potential vectors with Long Pocket Labs in Brisbane, and within two months I had met Harry on a field trip in Cunnamulla. These field programs reached a high point with a continuous 18-month collection program at the Coastal Plains Research Station (CPRS) around 60 km southeast of Darwin, from October 1974 to May 1976. The site was chosen as a likely location for BEF activity, based on data that had accumulated from sentinel herd monitoring. It was understood that this work was also preparation for the possible introduction to Australia of the exotic disease Bluetongue, which is transmitted by Culicoides biting midges, and which it was thought could devastate the Australian sheep industry.

The program at CPRS collected tens of thousands of biting midges and mosquitoes and produced 94 virus isolations, some of which were new to Australia and could not be immediately identified. The planning and operation of this program was overseen by Harry and Alan. At the time, Harry was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Army Reserve and the CO of the Queensland University Regiment. His military experience was obvious in the management of the logistics of this long distance operation from the Labs in Brisbane and Sydney as staff rotated through the northern field station and collections were catalogued and dispatched south for processing. Harry also had an interest in electronics which came to the fore in the use of light sensitive switches and other gadgets incorporated into various insect trapping and manipulation devices.

In early 1977 I transferred from McMaster Lab to Long Pocket Labs in Brisbane where Harry became my boss. My task was to develop techniques for manipulation of biting insects and viruses for vector competence studies with sheep and cattle in the newly commissioned Large Animal Insect Proof Laboratory at Long Pocket. This became very timely when in August 1977 one of the unknown viruses from CPRS, isolated from *Culicoides* collected in March 1975, was finally identified at the world reference laboratory at Yale as a bluetongue virus.

That set the course of our work for around the next 10 years. Veterinary Virologist Toby St George at Long Pocket had overall lead of the bluetongue response team, while Harry contributed firm and calm leadership of the entomology group. There were further excursions to the Darwin area over the next three years, once again involving Alan Dyce and a staff roster, and substantial logistical difficulties to overcome.

Although bluetongue was a primary focus at this time, other arboviruses were also studied, including BEF and a number of its close relatives found in cattle, and also the teratogenic viruses in the Simbu group such as Akabane and Aino. The CSIRO group was recognised internationally as a leading edge operation for veterinary arboviruses and vectors.

However, times changed and Harry found he was spending much of his time writing grant applications to keep the work going. In his own words, he "opted for a quiet retirement" in 1990. However, he was very soon in high demand as a consultant for local government mosquito management programs in Southeast Queensland. He was also engaged for surveys in the South Pacific for both potential livestock vectors and dengue vector studies. He also carried out mosquito surveys for development companies in Southeast Queensland.

In recognition of his contribution to the field of mosquito and arbovirus research, he was made a Fellow of the Queensland Institute of Medical Research in 1982 and a

member of the Order of Australia in 1998. There are also five species of biting fly bearing the species name *standfasti*.

While he ceased his field work some years ago, apart from operating a regular mosquito and midge light trap in his Chapel Hill back yard, he continued to attend the regular meetings of the local government mosquito management groups such as NEMMO (North East Moreton Mosquito Management Organisation) and CLAG (Contiguous Local Authorities Group), and he was an Honorary Member of the Mosquito and Arbovirus Research Committee Inc, based

in Southeast Queensland. He was a much respected mentor and sounding board for everyone from Councillors to managers to PhD students to field technicians.

My abiding memory of Harry is that he always knew the right questions to ask. He had one other saying which I think I have adopted, that "Unless I am over-committed, I am not working to full capacity".

Farewell, Harry. We will miss you.


